






Import References with X9 EndNote

Quick reference for Göteborgs universitet students from the Swedish Nerd!
Watched the video but don't remember everything? Use this to help you your first few times until you master importing your references.

Method 1: From the GU library:

<p>Step 1: Click on the link for your reference to open up a pop-up screen</p>	
<p>Step 2: In the pop-up screen, click on the button RIS (ENDNOTE M.FL)</p>	
<p>Step 3: A small area appears below. It can read "Kodning" or "Encoding." Click on the small triangle.</p>	
<p>Step 4: Click on the new button labelled UTF-8, then on the green "Ladda Ner" text below that. You will see a file downloading to your computer.</p>	
<p>Step 5: Now open your X9 EndNote, Click on File-> Import OR The Import button as shown here</p>	
<p>Step 6: In the pop-up window, Browse to select the downloaded file. Then VERY IMPORTANT!!! Make sure you select Import Option Reference Manager (RIS). Click Import. You will see your new reference appear in the Recently Added file to the left.</p>	

Method 2: From the Internet:
